Your guide to Madison County

A short history:

Madison County's earliest known people

Artifacts from local archaeological digs show that Madison County aborigines were camping around Hutto Pond, three miles southwest of the City of Madison, about 10,000 years ago. Tommy Greene's book, "Madison County, From The Beginning," says that arrow and spear points, dating back about 10,000 years, have been found in various parts of what is now Madison County.

After Juan Ponce de Leon landed in 1513, near what is now St. Augustine, he was followed by many other Spanish adventurers, among whom were Panfilo de Narvaez, Alvar Nunez Cabeza de Vaca and Hernando de Soto. With de Soto was Timucuan language interpreter, Juan Ortiz.

Searching from Tampa through North Florida for reported treasure, they entered Madison County, finding cultivated fields of maize, beans and pumpkins.

During this period, about 100 Native Americans in the area were rounded up, enslaved with chains and neck collars and forced to work as servants for the invading Spaniards.

In the mid-1500s, a French explorer named Groutald reported on his visit to the hostile Yustega tribe in what is now Madison County. From his report, the natives had added to their vegetable cultivation the industries of hunting, fishing and gathering of wild nuts and berries. According to this same report, the natives were also storing provisions for cold winters and emergencies.

When a permanent settlement had been established at St. Augustine, Spanish soldiers, accompanied by their Jesuit and Franciscan priests, continued their invasion, colonization and exploration of Florida. They also began to Christianize the Native American populations. In 1606, Bishop Fray Juan de las Cabezas Altamirano, the first Catholic bishop to come to Florida, spent months visiting missions.

The missionaries also instructed the Native Americans in agriculture. Winter wheat was

introduced and small fields were established.

In about 1630, five missions developed along what was later known as The Old Spanish Trail: San Juan (Saint John) de Guacara, on the east side of the Suwannee River; San Pedro y San Pablo de Protohiriba (Saints Peter and Paul), near Lake Sampala; Santa Elena (Saint Elaine) de Machaba, thought to be near Hixtown Swamp; San Mateo (Saint Matthew) de Tolapatafi, west of Sirmans; and San Miguel (Saint Michael) de Asile, west of the Aucilla River.

In 1972, a group of Florida State University archaeology students, headed by Calvin Jones, identified the locations of three buildings: a church, a convent and a storehouse; as well as a cemetery, with grave artifacts consisting of one brass crucifix (the first found in a Florida mission) and a small, broken brass bell.

Native Americans suffered harsh treatment as laborers. Their ancient customs were all but stifled, and they were subjected to European disease epidemics, all of which severely reduced their initial population.

Madison County missions came to an end in 1703, when the British and Creek Indians attacked the Timucuan missions, burning them to the ground and either killing the inhabitants or taking them as slaves.

The Yustega tribe had been exterminated. Taking its place were the Creek. This supplanting population, joined by escaped slaves, came to be known as the Seminoles, which is translated as "runaways." Another group, the Miccosukee, came from Alabama to live in Madison and Jefferson Counties.

From 1763 to 1783, during the 20 years of British control, many Loyalist families (colonists loyal to and supportive of the Britain Crown), moved into North Florida, pushing the Indians from their homes and fields, not recognizing any rights the Indians might have to the land they had

occupied for untold centuries.

Andrew Jackson was quoted as saying it was absurd to consider that the Indians had any rights at all.

With the land they cultivated further and further encroached upon, the Native American raids continued. In 1818 Andrew Jackson invaded Florida, pushing the Spanish, the British and the Indians out.

The Spaniards were less aggressive toward the

Native Americans than the British were. During the first Spanish occupation up to 1763, there was relatively little trouble. The Spaniards were not interested in colonizing the whole territory. The British policy, however, was one of expansion, pushing the Indians from their homes and fields

Kathryn Abbey Hanna, in her book, "Florida: Land of Change," said, "Florida pioneers were no more vindictive nor unscrupulous than other settlers, but they were more scared of a more secretive foe "

Likewise, Seminoles were no more diabolical or treacherous than other groups of their race. Yet, given the two races, plus the Florida swamps, there resulted one of the most

calamitous, prolonged and horrible episodes of that long struggle by which the white man supplanted the red.

Governor Duval appointed John Hicks in 1824, as the main spokesman of the Miccosukees and Tallahassees, appointing him to lead his people south from Hickstown to the reservation lands. James Bellamy was delegated by the Secretary of War to evaluate the properties and belongings of the tribes. Receipts were signed on Nov. 12, 1824.

Chief John Hicks agreed to receive \$680 to compensate for 43 homes that had housed the 318 members of his tribe. Chief Nehemathla Hajo received \$149 to replace the 11 homes which had housed the 43 men, women and children he cared for. The sums of money were also intended to cover the costs of transportation of the tribes to the reservation in the south of Florida.

Research shows the following: The cattle of the tribes were to be sold and more bought at the reservation site; however, many more were stolen than were paid for. Little of the promised money

> was ever seen by the Indians; some went for "costs," and some attached itself to the pockets of a few unscrupulous Indian agents.

Rations were slow in coming and were deliberately less than were needed in order to keep the Indians in a subservient condition.


An account of the two proud tribes of people from the north central region of Florida can be found in Marjory Stoneman Douglas' book, "Florida: The Long Frontier." Those who "had owned land, herds, gardens and orange trees, governing themselves well by their ancient

councils, were reduced to the most pitiful poverty. Their children starved, their young men were in furious revolt "

Indians and the European settlers were not willing to live

in peace with one another. They threatened and attacked one another through robbery, abduction and murder. The chiefs gave in to their agents, who had repeatedly been urging them to move their tribes out of the area.

The Indian town of Hickstown (south of I-10 near present-day Hickstown Swamp) was left abandoned when the Miccosukee tribes moved to the reservation. By the end of the first Seminole War (about 1840), all the Indians in what is now Madison County had vanished into the Florida Everglades.

Deep inside Madison County lies the call to relax and enjoy oneself. The natural, scenic beauty of this rural area captivates residents and passersby alike, beckoning all to experience the opportunities for leisure and escape.

Hunting

Natives brag about the majestic deer that dwell within the pine forests that stretch and roll across Madison County. Their claims are valid. According to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Buck Registry, Madison County is ranked among the top 10 largest registered scores in typical deer and non-typical deer in the State of Florida. Seated at number nine in typical deer is Chris Harrell's 1987 buck, scoring 156 7/8 inches. In non-typical deer, Bruce Holley ranks at number eight, measuring a whopping 176 3/8 inches. Holley's buck was named the Florida Buck of the Year by Woods 'n Water Magazine in 2012, weighing approximately 218 lb.

Fishing

Fishermen are just as fortunate. In addition to the Suwannee, Aucilla and Withlacoochee Rivers, a wealth of local ponds offer boat and bank fishing with tasty bass and bream just waiting to be hooked. Cherry Lake promises good results, too. The large freshwater body, located on NE Cherry Lake Circle, houses a public boat ramp with one single lane. Parking is available.

Recreation/Leisure

Cherry Lake has a public swimming beach and retreating enclave. Locals and visitors enjoy boating, tubing, water skiing and swimming in the beautiful, vast lake. The location is a lovely, serene example of what life in Madison County is like. For more information, call the Madison County Recreation Department at (850) 973-4640.

Madison Blue Springs, located on Hwy. 6, on the banks of the Withlacoochee River, is a beautiful bluegreen, first-magnitude spring, and is Madison County's only state park. The spring is about 82 feet wide and 25 feet deep. Folks can hold church picnics, stroll the nature trails, go diving, access the canoe launch on the banks of the Withlacoochee or leap into the 72-degree water for a swim. Madison Blue Springs is a natural spring with a flow rate of 150 million gallons per day. Furthermore, when *floridaspringlife.com* ranked the

best springs in the state of Florida, they ranked Madison's Blue Springs as the number two best blue spring, number three best county-owned spring, number three most photogenic and number two best cave diving spring. Call (850) 971-5003 for more information.

The Four Freedoms Trail, paralleling Colin Kelly Hwy., from Madison to Pinetta, and then on to the Georgia border, offers an incredible hiking/biking venue. According to the Madison County Recreation Department, the trail was constructed as a joint effort between the county, Suwannee River Water Management District, the Office of Greenways and Trails and the Florida Department of Transportation. As a result, the trail was created without using any of Madison County's ad valorem tax dollars. The 12-mile recreational trail extends north from the city limits of Madison to the Withlacoochee River at the Florida-Georgia border. People can enjoy walking, biking and horseback riding along the paved trail, which provides covered rest areas along the way.

The Florida National Scenic Trail (FNST), also known as the Florida Trail, is one of only 11 designated national scenic trails in the United States. From the southern terminus in Big Cypress National

Preserve – approximately 80 miles east of Naples – this trail travels 1,300 miles across the state to the Gulf Islands National Seashore in Pensacola. This scenic trail winds through swampland, pine flat woods, hardwoods, oak hammocks and salt marshes, giving way to an ever-changing array of Floridian ecosystems. The northern region takes hikers west to the beautiful limestone out-cropped banks of the Suwannee River from White Springs to the Twin Rivers State Forest. The panhandle region travels further west across the Aucilla Wildlife Management Area towards the breathtaking white beaches of the Gulf Islands. The FNST can be accessed in Madison County by traveling west on 90 to the Twin Rivers State Park. Trailheads can be found on both sides of US Hwy. 90, but some of the best with scenic river views are along NE Ellaville Central Avenue and from the parking area at the end of NE Drew Way. Ragans Family Campground, located at 1051 SW Old St. Augustine Road, in Madison, boasts a 60 ft. tall water slide called the "Tornado," a Wet & Wild Train Ride, as well as Wibit Lake, a 12-foot deep man-made lake, with an epic floating obstacle course. From cooling off at the water park to riding ATVs throughout the trails and mining for gems in the mining sluice, there is something for everyone to enjoy. Admission price depends on what's happening. Call (850) 973-8269 for more information.

Stop by **Four Freedoms Park** when strolling in downtown Madison and eat lunch on a bench, relaxing among the azaleas and day lilies.

Take in the **Treasures of Madison County Museum** on the corner of SW Range Ave. and Rutledge St., in the historic W.T. Davis Building. Hours are currently 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., Tuesday through Friday, and 12 p.m. to 2 p.m., on Saturdays.

At **Haffye Hayes Park**, in Greenville, the pond, walking trail, playground, Ray Charles memorial and gazebo invite moments of reflection.

Local events and celebrations

Throughout the year, folks are presented with many opportunities to get together, relax and play in Madison County. Add piano and dance recitals, sporting events, church homecomings, game nights and fifth-Sunday Church sings, stir vigorously and enjoy! Check out some of Madison County's most eagerly-anticipated events below:

The annual Livestock Show and Sale offers the opportunity for young people from around the region to show cattle and pigs they have raised, with several awards given for various categories. The event takes place in the Agricultural Center in February of each year.

Down Home Days is hosted by the Madison County Chamber of Commerce annually in April. The anticipated event features interesting street vendors, an elaborate parade and entertainment from the local dance studio.

The 20th of May Celebration is held each year in Madison during the month of May. The celebration commemorates one of the most

important dates in Florida history for African-Americans. It was on May 20, 1865, that U.S. General Edward McCook declared the Amancipation Proclamation in effect. THe same day that Gen. McCook made his declaration in Tallahassee, an announcement, sent by Maj. Gen. Quincy A. Gillmore, arrived in Tallahassee via train noting that "the people of the black race are free citizens of the United States."

The God and Country Festival at Lake Frances is an annual Fourth of July event hosted by the Madison Lions Club. Complete with street vendors and a beautiful fireworks display, this annual event is a can't miss!

Founders Day is held yearly at the Hickory Grove United Methodist Church in October, with activities including cane grindings and syrupmaking, just like it was done over 100 years ago; sausage-making in the 'ol smokehouse; butter churning; re-caning old chairs; quilting demonstrations and homemade jelly in the Hickory Grove Country Store. Locals always anticipate the quilting demonstration, the making of cane syrup, homemade breakfast and an abundance of food. The Hickory Grove Singing Stage is always filled with songs you know, just before the old-time preacher shows up to give an inspiring message to the crowd.

Lee Homecoming Day is held in early November with a community breakfast, parade, live music, vendors and much more. The event takes place at 286 County Road 255, in the "Little but Proud" town of Lee, in eastern Madison County.

Light Up Madison, sponsored by the Madison Kiwanis Club, is a fun-filled Christmas spectacular anticipated by locals during the first weekend in December. There are many fun activities, special holiday performances, a visit from Santa Claus, street vendors and an amazing Christmas lights parade.

A Greenville Christmas, formerly known as Greenville Country Christmas, is held annually in December at Haffye Hayes Park, in downtown Greenville. Locals come together to enjoy a festive parade, food vendors, craft vendors, entertainment, a cake auction and much more!

Recycling

Presently, the Madison County

Solid Waste Department has 13 full service recycling collection centers throughout the county in addition to the main headquarters on Rocky Ford Road. For more information, call (850) 973-2611.

The collection centers allow you to take care of recycling and solid waste disposal all in one visit. Each center has different areas set up for newspapers, glass, plastic, aluminum and steel cans. Areas are also designated where you can drop off old furniture, metal appliances and yard trash, as well as your household garbage.

No tires, oil or batteries will be accepted at any of these centers. You'll have to take those items to the main Solid Waste/Recycling Department, located at 2505 Rocky Ford Rd., in Madison, open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The Solid Waste Department also offers free household hazardous waste collections twice a year for all county residents.

New power-driven trash compactors, which reduce the volume of waste in the areas where dumpsters have now been placed, have reduced the number of dumpsters needed at each site. Additionally, these new trash compactors are contained within fenced areas to control the amount of out-of-county items being "donated" to Madison County for disposal. The 13 sites are currently open, and operational hours are posted at each site. Locations include main headquarters on Rocky Ford Road, Ravenswood (Hwy. 90), Lee (Hwy. 255),

Tax Collector Lisa Tuten will mail you a reminder in November of each year regarding county taxes that need to be paid by the end of the following March.

Property Taxes

Your tax bill is determined by the local taxing districts (Madison County Commission, Suwannee River Water Management District, School District and

municipalities). The appraisals for property are done by Property Appraiser Leigh Barfield's office, which is located on the second floor of the Courthouse Annex.

Property owners are taxed on the assessed value of the property times the county millage rate minus any exemptions for which they qualify.

The current millage rate varies and the taxes increase if the property is located within a municipality (i.e., if you live in the City of Madison, the Town of Lee or Greenville).

Homestead Exemption

To claim a homestead exemption or other exemptions, such as widow/widower's exemption or senior citizen's exemption, the property owner must go to Barfield's office to fill out the appropriate paperwork in order to claim the exemption. The deadline is March 1. A new law requires yearly registration if there is any change in the property status.

Licenses & Permits

Lisa Tuten serves as the county's tax collector. Besides property taxes, Tuten and her staff collect revenue from occupational license fees (set by the county commissioners) and from hunting and fishing license fees (set by the state).

You may call the tax collector's office to locate the figures for the 2023 tax season. Tuten's office is

located on the ground floor of the Courthouse Annex, Room 102. Call **(850) 973-6136** for more information.

Vehicle Registration

After you purchase a car or reside in the state with a new or used car, the State of Florida requires you to register the vehicle for 12 months (primary owner's birthday to birthday) with the Florida Division of Motor Vehicles (FDMV). Registration consists of the following items: 1.) Serially numbered validation decal to be placed on license plate, attached in a visible place on the rear of the vehicle. A registration certificate (keep a copy handy in your vehicle at all times, as you may be asked to present it to any law enforcement officer in case of an accident or an alleged traffic law violation or infraction).

Registration will require that you bring with you to the FDMV office: 1.) Proof of Florida insurance (issued or countersigned by a Florida agent); 2.) Vehicle title; 3.) Proof of Identity (photo driver license or current passport) and 4.) Taxes and fees, including an initial registration fee of \$225. Chapter 320, Florida Statutes, enumerates Florida law regarding these requirements. Building Permits

If you are planning to build in the near future, you should seek out the Building Department on the second floor of the Courthouse Annex and call **(850) 973-6785**.


Newcomers who plan to occupy a mobile or manufactured home need to visit the same Building Department office, where they can pick up a packet of information regarding county requirements for mobile home residents. Also available from the Building Department is a checklist which outlines requirements for a permit for mobile home residents. Voting

Elected officials play an important role in the quality of life in Madison County. To be eligible to cast a ballot for your elected officials, you must be registered to vote. You may pick up a voter registration application at one of the following locations: Supervisor of Elections Office, county library, city and town hall, the Tax Collectors Office or you may register online at www.votemadison.com.

Registration is quick and easy, and once your application has been processed, you will receive a voter

information card through the mail. It is important to remember that this voter information card is not a form of ID and is for informational purposes only. You must provide a photo and signature identification when you go to vote in person. A voter's driver's license or Florida-issued identification works great. It is encouraged that you review your

voter information card for accuracy and to familiarize yourself with your district number and precinct location.

Circuit Court

The office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court has both court and Madison County government responsibilities.

The Clerk serves as the Clerk of both the circuit and county courts, helping people gain access to the courts while maintaining the courts' records for criminal felony and misdemeanor cases, circuit and county civil, family, probate and small claims proceedings, juvenile cases and traffic citations. In addition to

collecting and disbursing court fines and fees, the Clerk's office handles jury summons, juror and witness fees, issues marriage licenses and processes passport applications.

The Constitution of Florida also specifies the Clerk serves as the Clerk of the Board of County
Commissioners and Clerk to the Value Adjustment Board.
As Comptroller, the Clerk is the custodian of all county funds and responsible for the safekeeping of the county's revenues and watching over its expenditures. The Clerk also serves the public as the County Recorder and guardian of the public records of Madison County that go back to 1831




Madison County Voting Map

MADISON COUNTY MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Madison County Memorial Hospital (MCMH) has been serving the region for 87 years. With an emphasis on patient-centered care, MCMH engages the patient's entire family in the process and strives to provide innovative services for our community.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

Emergency specialists consist of physicians, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, licensed nurses, emergency technicians and respiratory therapists who stand ready to accommodate a variety of emergency procedures, such as diagnostics, accident, injury, disease management, stabilization and transport.

TELEMEDICINE

In 2015, the hospital implemented a TeleStroke program by one of the latest technologies in emergency stroke care with a tele-medicine robot named R.E.T.A, - Remote Emergency Telemedicine Assistant. This service provides the emergency room professionals with remote board-certified neurologists available 24/7. These neurologists examine the patient, evaluate the CT scan of their brain and make recommendations to the MCMH team for the best possible patient outcomes. In 2019, inpatient TeleCardiology consultations were added with Board Certified Cardiologists capability to listen to heart sounds by way of a Bluetooth stethoscope and provide a face-to-face assessment through a telemedicine robot.

INPATIENT SERVICES

Inpatient services include all other services as needed when serving acute care or observation patients who are staying in the hospital for treatment. Additionally, MCMH offers Swing Bed services. What is Swing-Bed? It is offered to patients who no longer require acute inpatient services but instead need extra time for healing. To qualify as a patient in the Swing Bed program, a person must have no less than a three-night hospital stay within the past 30 days. This program is provided to MCMH patients as well as patients who are in other hospitals and have a need for skilled nursing services, and/or physical, speech, or

occupational therapy before returning home. Skilled services include IV antibiotics, rehabilitation therapy, tube feedings and nutritional stabilization, wound care, respiratory and care for terminally ill patients needing pain control or supportive care. Call the Case Management office at (850) 253-1956 to see if you or your loved one qualifies!

Patients receive a private room along with personalized care tailored to their needs through a team of physicians, nurses, physical, speech, and occupational therapists, respiratory therapists, radiology and laboratory technicians, dieticians, activities coordinator, chaplains and case managers. No matter what facility you may have been discharged from, Madison County Memorial Hospital is able to work with your physicians and surgeons to develop an individualized care plan. Additionally, a team is available to provide support for your family or caregiver and/or help connect you to other services. Call the business office at (850) 973-2271 to see if you or your loved one qualifies!

OUTPATIENT SERVICES

Madison County Memorial Hospital is here for youall within the comfort of your community. Outpatient services include laboratory, diagnostics, rehabilitation, respiratory, wound care, endoscopy and elective surgery.

Outpatient rehabilitation services, including physical and occupational therapy, allow patients who may have been injured in a car accident or experienced a stroke or heart attack to get back to living an independent life. Together, the rehabilitation team has over 50 years combined experience and works directly with the patient to increase function and performance and to maximize their potential for returning to work, school, community and home with enhanced daily living skills.

DIAGNOSTIC SERVICES

MCMH diagnostic services include - Endoscopy, Radiology, Laboratory, and Respiratory/ Cardiopulmonary. MCMH Radiology provides diagnostic services such as ECHO and Vascular Studies, CAT Scan, Fluoroscopy, Ultrasound, Mammography,

and X-Ray. These services are critical in helping the medical team determine a patient's current condition as well as provide preventive services to mitigate chronic conditions.

ENDOSCOPY

MCMH Endoscopy program diagnoses and treats a wide range of gastrointestinal conditions. The goal of this department is to increase awareness and screening for colon cancer in the region. CITY OF MADISON

The City of Madison was founded on land secured from Madison C. Livingston, on May 2, 1838, and established as the county seat after its removal from San Pedro. An early political center, it was along the escape route of Confederate Secretary of War John C. Breckenridge in 1865. The town played a prominent role in the development of tobacco, livestock raising and conservation in North Florida, and the area's economy is based on agriculture and industry.

Cotton planters settled the town of Madison in 1838, though there were residents here before that. The county was established in 1827 and by 1850, the county population had grown to more than 5,000 people.

The world's largest long-staple cotton gin was located in Madison before the boll weevil arrived in 1916, and wiped out the cotton industry. The "cotton years" memories are preserved in a small park near the Amtrak railroad station on the south side of town. In the park is a 16-foot drive wheel for a 500 horse power engine that once pulled 65 gins in what was said to be the "world's largest cotton processing plant."

The oldest house in town, still occupied, was built in 1849, and a small wooden Episcopal church, built in 1843, is still in use. In the center of Madison is the Wardlaw-Smith-Goza house, a stately mansion that dates from 1860 and served as a Confederate hospital during the War between the States.

Also, in the heart of downtown Madison is the Four Freedoms Park. The park is a beautifully landscaped city-block area containing a large gazebo and the Four Freedoms monument. This famous monument honors Colin P. Kelley, a former Madison County resident who was recognized as the first US. hero of World War II and who was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for his bravery and valor in combat.

The City of Madison, with a population of just over 3,000, serves as the county seat for Madison County's government. For over 50 years, the city has served as home of North Florida College. Downtown

Madison is filled with quaint gift shops, antique stores, outdoor shops and nice eateries. The downtown area is overflowing with classic 150 to nearly 200-year-old homes and buildings.

TOWN OF GREENVILLE

From the church on the hill, with its mighty white columns, to the famous statue of the legendary Ray Charles, the Town of Greenville surely sticks out to every passerby. Located in western Madison County, the little town has served as a home to many for hundreds of years. Its culture is unlike any other and its residents, more like family.


Incorporated in 1907, the town was first established in 1850, and its post office was given the name of Sandy Ford. However, during the Civil War, the place was given the name of "Station Five," because it was the fifth station from the capital. A women's sewing circle was organized in the town to sew for the soldiers in the Confederate Army and the first box of supplies that was sent to the commissary in Richmond was designated as coming from Station Five. The quartermaster wrote the president of the society that packages would have to be given in the name of a town. The ladies met and agreed to call the town Greenville, as a tribute to Mrs. U.M. Roberts, president of the society, who came from Greenville, S.C. The Spanish missions of San Miguel de Asylo and San Mateo de Tolapato were both located near the area.

In modern times, Greenville is best known as being the childhood home of rhythm and blues legend, Ray Charles. "Ray Charles: Man and Music," a biography written by Michael Lydon, details Charles' upbringing in Greenville, from learning to play the piano at Mr. Pit's Red Wing Cafe, attending Greenville Training School, losing his brother in a tragic washtub drowning and, eventually, leaving the small town to attend a school for the deaf and blind in St. Augustine, Fla.

The Town Council for the Town of Greenville is elected by the citizens of the town.

TOWN OF LEE

Not much has changed in the "Little but Proud" Town of Lee (current population approx. 338), where Heaven still smiles down on Earth. Only two miles from Interstate 10, five miles west of the Suwannee River and 30 miles from Valdosta, Ga., Lee is an easy drive from anything one wants or needs to do. The Town of Lee is a haven from the stress of big city life, with a tranquil atmosphere that offers total relaxation for both the mind and body.

Chartered in 1909, the Town of Lee is said to have originated in the mind of Greenberry Haven, a pioneer of the pre-Civil War era. One version suggests that Lee was named after the first railroad supervisor, Jim Lee, for whom the depot was named. Another story is that Lee was named after General Robert E. Lee, commander-in-chief of the Confederate armed forces during the Civil War, who visited here. The post office was opened in 1882 and John Haven then chose the name. Philip Newland had established a limekiln in the town.

The Town of Lee is governed by a town council and a mayor, all elected by the town's citizens.

In an effort to encourage economic development, the Lee Town Council obtained the vacated Lee School building to establish a business incubator. The location of this site is in an Enterprise Zone which provides state financial incentives for new businesses. The intent of this project is to assist with the development of small businesses by providing office space at a reduced rate, and to assist with the promotion of their product.

The building has 9,928 square feet of office space, which has been divided into 19 offices ranging from 110 to 1,300 square feet. The complex has been divided into two sections: one area for the development of a small business incubator and the other to provide services to the community.

The Town of Lee continues to encourage economic growth and is eager to assist with

CHERRY LAKE

Cherry Lake is one of Madison County's unincorporated communities. Nestled in the northern region of Madison County, just west of Pinetta, the community is a beautiful and historic rarity. Visitors and locals who drive State Road 53 North from the City of Madison, will soon make contact with a bustling intersection at NW County Rd. 223. At this intersection, sits the Cherry Lake General Store and the B&B—in front of each, you'll find locals enjoying a cup of coffee, grabbing a bite to eat and talking about days gone by.

Speaking of days gone by, the community's history is extraordinarily rich. One of the area's most interesting historic facts includes Cherry Lake Farms of the 1930s. According to The State Archives of Florida, Cherry Lake Farms (also known as Cherry Lake Rural Rehabilitation Project) was a New Deal rural relief program initiated by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA) and the Resettlement Administration (RA) and implemented by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). The project involved moving 500 needy families from Tampa, Miami and Jacksonville onto a 15,000 acre communal tract. The workers formed the cooperatively-owned Cherry Lake Farms (headquartered in the Hinton House, an 1839 former plantation home) and constructed a school, an auditorium, a coop store, barracks, a lumber yard and a mill. Families lived in 170 cottages with phones, electricity and running water. Many of their descendants still inhabit the community today.

Further up State Road 53 North, sightseers will come upon NE Cherry Lake Circle, where the community's treasure lies. Down this road is the famous Cherry Lake, a vast, beautiful lake with access to a public boat ramp, public swimming

beach and retreating enclave. Locals and visitors enjoy boating, tubing, water skiing and swimming at the lake, which also houses the beautiful campground, Camp Cherry Lake, one of the three 4-H Camps left in the State of Florida.

Camp Cherry Lake provides a number of opportunities, including an auditorium that seats 200; audio and visual equipment by request; a dining hall with climate control, seating 150; overnight accommodations in 14 rustic cabins, sleeping 10 each; staff cabins with climate control, which provide enough sleeping arrangements for 50 people; an outdoor pavilion with a large barbecue grill; a campfire circle; waterfront facilities with kayaks, fishing and swimming; a ball field and recreational equipment available upon request.

PINETTA

Pinetta is a quiet and serene community in the northeast portion of Madison County, just below the Georgia line. However, Pinetta got off to a much busier start roughly 100 years ago, as the railroad came into the area. The new mode of transportation dried up the nearby community of Leeland, bringing Pinetta into its prime.

The heavy traffic around the depot brought numerous businesses to the area, including a grocery store, pharmacy, blacksmith, bank, boarding house, turpentine still, barrel making company and a cotton and corn market at the depot. In 1905, the first school was erected. The late Audrey Leslie's records of the historic community of Pinetta include the eventful lunch periods that frequently saw nearby hogs squealing into the school grounds hoping to find some leftovers. Students paid 10 cents for hot lunches consisting of sausage or ham, biscuits or sweet potatoes. Some students brought lunches from home that featured biscuits flavored with bacon grease. Students unable to pay for lunch could bring items to trade or work in the kitchen to pay for their meals. There were several other schools located throughout the Pinetta area that were eventually consolidated in 1934.

The school was a hub of social activity in those

early days, hosting all sorts of gatherings. A major source of entertainment and pride for the folks of Pinetta revolved around the game of basketball. The community was proud of the fact that their little school would frequently defeat much larger area schools. The 1959 boys' team was well known for having some stand-out talent. Jerry Bass, number 25, went on to be considered one of the best players in Pinetta's history and Bobby Joe Buchanan, number 42, went on to shine for the Madison High School Red Devils and played at North Florida Junior College before they had an official team. Nicky Strickland, number 44, was particularly good on the 1959 team, as was Ronald Bass, number 31. The fervor surrounding Pinetta residents' love for basketball continued well into the 60s. The late Randall Buchanan was one of the players and coaches to continue the legacy of excellence and commitment to the sport.

The number of churches in Pinetta continued to blossom in the early 1900s, including the founding of Pinetta First Baptist Church on June 26, 1918. The late Rosa Lee Townsend recounts an incident in 1886 at a church with some rowdy young men outside during the service. The pastor sent someone out to invite them inside. Suddenly, the building began to shake as if it were being moved from its foundation and then it stopped. The pastor felt that God was doing something about the situation in a powerful way, but it turned out that the shaking was from an earthquake taking place in South Carolina.

Today, Pinetta still holds a place in the hearts of Madison County locals who call the community home. Pinetta Elementary School (PES), as in days gone by, is still the community's stronghold, serving the students in the area and preparing them to become independent learners, with the desires, the skills and the abilities necessary for life long learning, according to PES' mission statement.

The newcomer with spare time can find several opportunities for civic groups or charitable organizations.
